Lend A Hand Society strives to improve the lives of low-income families, individuals, seniors and disabled people primarily in the greater Boston, Massachusetts area. Working with advocates at nonprofit social service agencies who make requests on behalf of their clients, LAH provides financial assistance to meet the basic needs of those who need help and does so in a timely, dignified way.

History

Lend A Hand Society was founded in 1890 by Dr. Edward Everett Hale and incorporated in 1892. Dr. Hale was a renowned philosopher, author, Unitarian minister and philanthropist whose philosophy of reaching out to help people in need became the guiding principle for LAH. Hale played an important role in many social issues of his day - the abolition of slavery, the temperance movement, the U.S. Sanitary Commission, the formation of the Associated Charities and world peace movements. In 1890, in partnership with Sarah Brigham, LAH began to send books to prisons, rural libraries and schools in the South regardless of the race of their students. Locally, Hale was involved in the establishment of the Floating Hospital for Children. His book Ten Times One is Ten was the inspiration for the rise of over 800 Lend A Hand Clubs. Hale's philosophy and many wonderful mottos continue to teach and inspire us over a century later.

THE YEAR

In 2017 LAH received 839 requests for emergency assistance from over 100 nonprofit agencies for their clients struggling to hold on to or obtain housing, utilities, and other basic necessities. LAH made grants to help 469 households like:

Ms. M does not have any family in the area and was in danger of losing her apartment for herself, her newborn, and young son due to owing **back rent**. Referred by Codman Square Health Center

Being seen at the clinic for health problems, Mr. B had fallen behind in his **rent** and was in fear of becoming homeless and on the street again.

Referred by Boston Health Care for the Homeless Program

Suffering from a number of disabling medical conditions and confined to a wheelchair, Ms. B's vision has been affected by chemotherapy and she needed corrective lenses.

Referred by South End Community Health Center

A single mother of two children, Ms. G was trying to make ends meet and fell behind in her **utility payments** during the winter months. She is struggling to keep the electricity on in her apartment.

Referred by Second Step

LAH has maintained Hale's simple approach continuing the simplicity and practicality of the program, which gets people who are in crisis what they need easily and quickly at a time when few if any resources are available.

Grants to nonprofit camping agencies provided scholarships for children and teenagers. Camperships benefit inner city youth who are given the opportunity to attend creative, educational, recreational and nurturing camp programs in rural settings outside the city.
